

- Convince a "likely" school you are serious about them








- "Tell me something about yourself"... your <u>passions</u>, strengths, <u>voice</u>
- Why they want you in their classrooms and on their campus that they can't learn otherwise from application
- Challenging to be truly original but you can always be authentic!!!!






Tell a story about yourself => Go deep

- That puts you in a positive light
- An experience that feels meaningful
- The event(s) changed you in a positive way
- <u>Short</u> brief moment in time








- "A blue seventh place athletic ribbon hangs from my mantel. Every day, as I walk into my living room, the award mockingly congratulates me as I smile."

2. Use a montage structure => Go wide



- Create a whole from separate fragments
- Few images that tell the whole story
- Little glimpses into your life
- Focusing "lens" or metaphor
- Start from point where you want to end up

- I look at the ticking, white clock: it's eleven at night, my primetime. I clear the carpet of the Sony camera charger, the faded Levi's, and last week's Statistics homework. Having prepared my work space, I pull out the big, blue box and select two 12 by 12 crème sheets of paper.

+ International Clichés


- "I am a child or 2 (or 3 or 6) worlds."

What do I want colleges to learn about me?




"I want to show my colleges I'm well-rounded, so I wrote a poem in Spanish about how chess club has made me a better quarterback."

- Series of small incidents with a common theme, focusing lens


Be prepared to try multiple topics

Your voice

□ Think of a friend or young person (under 30) that you talking to

- □ No thesaurus words!
- Does it sound like you?
- Show, then tell. Or tell, then prove with examples

□ Show

- Anecdotes
- What you saw, heard, touched, …

Tell

- Why important?
- What does it mean?
- Be prepared to try a new topic



- 20 minutes set a timer
- Write continuously, way over 650 words
 - Don't worry about first sentences, spelling or grammar no corrections. Just write.
 - **Repeat your last line until something else occurs to you**

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+ Writing Assignment - Optional

- <u>Underline</u> the parts that "sound like you"
- Highlight where you are showing, not telling
- Is it a story?
 - □ Is there a point in time?
 - Does something out of the ordinary take place?
 - Is there a struggle between opposing forces, a <u>conflict</u>, that gets resolved?
 - □ Is there a point to the story?
- Is it a montage?
 - □ What is your theme/focusing lens?
- Revise. Still don't worry about starting sentence.
